OCRINT UPDATES

The Canadian Research Initiative in Substance Misuse has reached the end of its five-year funding, and is up for renewal. While CIHR determines the renewal process, they have agreed to extend the CRISM network for 1 more year (2019-2020). Each Node has recently submitted a proposal to CIHR for the extension period.

1. OCRINT Symposium

Based on the changes in the renewal process, OCRINT will be hosting the second annual symposium in <u>Fall 2019 in Toronto</u> (instead of June, as originally indicated). Save the dates will be coming out very soon! The symposium will offer an opportunity to share research findings from different projects, discuss priorities for future work, and vote on upcoming priorities for the network through a questionnaire. All members will be invited and encouraged to invite colleagues, friends, peers who work in the substance use area.

2. Development of New Demonstration Projects

Based on the results of our first OCRINT symposium, and through extensive collaboration with our members, OCRINT has developed three independent demonstration projects in partnership with members of our Node.

- (1) A partnership with Toronto Public Health to address "not in my backyard" (NIMBY) attitudes among communities located near safe injection sites in Toronto. We will also be conducting research to inform future policies related to safe consumption sites in the province.
- (2) OCRINT is working with Addictions and Mental Health Ontario, ConnexOntario, and people with lived experience to conduct a comprehensive survey of people with lived experience as well as provincial service providers to identify current gaps in service access and provision for individuals who use drugs and key priorities for future research. OCRINT is consulting extensively with current members (service providers, peers) on the development of the survey and questionnaire tool. The results will inform new project development and implementation.
- (3) OCRINT is conducting an evaluation of the Blunt Truth campaign materials among organizations, services and institutions that have purchased the youth designed tool to use cannabis with lower risk (this is an adaptation of the Lower Risk Cannabis Use Guidelines; Fischer et al., 2017). The survey will be developed collaboratively among youth, researchers, and other stakeholders. The data collected will result in recommendations on how to improve the effectiveness and uptake for a future iteration of the tool.

Stay Tuned: OCRINT is launching a Community Competition Grant (subject to final approval of CIHR!)

During our OCRINT Symposium in January, there was expressed interest from the stakeholders to have a funding pool to support different community-based research projects. We are aware that community-based organizations and services may not always have the resources or support needed to carry out important research projects. As such, OCRINT is in the process of developing a community competition, whereby members can submit a project proposal to apply for up to a maximum of \$35,000 to support a 1-year community-based project. These proposed projects can either be developed individually (organizational/institutional) based, or in collaboration with other stakeholder groups. This will foster a collaborative environment where service providers, researchers, peers, and/or policy makers can work together and in an attempt to address shared priorities. OCRINT is committed to creating trusting collaborative working relationships among our members. We will send out more information once it becomes available.
